It was not until after my grandfather lost his 15-year-old son in a motorcycle accident that he chose to stop drinking. His life changed, but it came as a result of great loss.

One has to ask, "Is it 'antiquated' to want to give our children and grandchildren a safe place to live? Placing harmful influences in front of them is not responsible parenting. It sends them a message that there is no difference between a soft drink and hard liquor.
